We are God's accomplishment, created in Christ Jesus to do good things. God planned for these good things to be the way that we live our lives. Ephesians 2:10



Lenten Study "Because of this I Rejoice" By Max O Vincent

Have you ever thought of Lent being a time of Joy? Easter, definitely! But Lent is consider solemn, deep reflection time in which we sacrifice, repent, have longing and seek forgiveness.

The author of "Because of this I Rejoice" leads us through Lent in a renewal and thankful way. Christ brought freedom, relief, conquered death and restored our relationship to God. What's not to rejoice and be glad about? He restored our souls, and gave us new life a resurrected life based on Good News!

As we go through Lent this year we will be focusing on Philippians and the Apostle Paul.

Philippians: 1:4 always offering every prayer of mine with joy [and with specific requests] for all of you,

Philippians: 1:21[To *Live Is Christ*] for to me, to live is Christ [He is my source of joy, my reason to live] and to die is gain [for I will be with Him in eternity].

Philippians: 1:25 since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in the faith,

Philippians:2:2 make my joy complete by being of the same mind, having the same love [toward one another], knit together in spirit, intent on one purpose [and living a life that reflects your faith and spreads the gospel—the good news regarding salvation through faith in Christ].

Last Sunday the Reflections from Scripture challenged each to answer their call.

Dan McIntyre was concerned about The Bishop, and our National United Methodist Church, not making a stronger statement about the inhuman treatment of immigrants. Dan had concerns and felt he should take action.

The proper procedure for taking action is to submit a petition/resolution submission form directly to the Conference Committee. The deadline for the submission was approaching quickly so Dan needed to take action as soon as possible. Through the advice of a former chair of the rules committee we moved forward with completing the form and getting it submitted in the appropriate time frame.

The form required that we had to quote from the United Methodist Book of Discipline which, since it is scriptural based, was not hard to do. We also had to choose if it was a petition or a resolution. A Petition being defined as a formal statement requesting the Conference (through the staff, commissions, committee, teams, boards or agencies) to take a certain action. A Resolution being defined as a formal statement expressing the opinion, will, or intent of the conference.

Dan submitted the form as a petition and I, Joy, serving as Pastor, had to verify membership of Dan McIntyre and identify the church.

The below petition/resolution submission form is to inform the congregation of this action.

Brief Rationale:

Whereas, since we are people of OUR God who commands we love our neighbors as ourselves and we had one of our local neighbors who cooks for the local food pantry for 10 years recently, inhumanly taken from cooking to prison because his citizenship has not been established even though he has worked for ten years to become a citizen.

Whereas, we of the United Methodist Church believe in a God of compassion and find need for more Formal Pronouncement to Our United States Government that just treatment of all human beings is part of Our Nation's Character as a melting Pot for all to come to this Land of Milk and Honey.

Whereas, treatment of/by ICE and Government immigration has been cruel, unjust, separating children from parents and even caused death, and inhuman according to the standards given us from scriptures and the Book of Discipline.

Whereas, Visible, well-advertised, unified, denouncement of such treatment by the Council of Bishops, or the National United Methodist Church has not been made known nor promoted in a formal declaration.

<u>Therefore, be it resolved</u> that the Upper New York Conference send a declaration of Hope to the Council of Bishops that they will send a formal demand that the US Government promote compassion, and just treatment to ALL immigrants no matter their status as illegal or legal immigrants.

Therefore, be it resolved that being aware of this inhuman treatment and no visible signs of success after a decade the government be made accountable for such anti United States treatment and reprimanded, and even apologize.

Therefore be it further resolved that the statement of the Council of Bishops strongly support legislation as soon as possible to both increase the ability to become citizens and protect those already seeking citizenship from deportation.

I wouldn't be at church on Sunday if it wasn't for Skate Church"
